In this presentation, Dean and Neil will present their fully automated systems. Dean will show how his simple continuous water changing system allows him to directly use tap water without any pretreatment including use of Seachem Prime. No hoses or buckets are needed. Neil has been running his tap water through a carbon filter and doing weekly 50% batch changes. He will present his recent continuous water change automation of 28 tanks. January begins our 2023 year with our monthly meeting on Thursday January 5 @ 7:30PM at the Vet School. Our program will feature Dean Di Lillo and Neil Frank on "Drip, drip, drip - automated water changes for 1 or more tanks," where they will describe alternatives to lugging buckets or using a water python.

Our December meeting featured the return of our Holiday Party, for the first time in 3 years. Rather than having a full-blown dinner, folk brought in cookies and other sweets to share. From the voting, Thomas Sanford took first place, John Adams and Richard & Maggie Poole tied for 2nd and Matt DeGroodt took 3rd place. Each won Amazon gift cards. BAP Program

Matt DeGroodt is our BAP Chair for 2023 and he is in the process of setting up a BAP committee, please contact him if you are interested. The 2022 BAP Awards Ceremony was held at the NCSU vet school auditorium on the evening of Thursday, December 1st during the annual RAS holiday party.

14 people submitted a total of 101 successful spawns of species during the 2022 BAP season. 1,455 BAP points were awarded.

6 people achieved new award levels: Breeder award level: Grey Rogers, Anthony Romano, and Brenton Koenig; Advanced & Expert level: Richard & Maggie Poole; Distinguished Master Breeder & Honorary Lifetime Member: Paul Parks; and Grand Master Breeder: Neil Frank.

Richard & Maggie Poole won the 2022 Breeder of the Year award by submitting 31 species for a total of 410 points.

(Article) CAW Shrimp Bowl Contest by Richard Mullinax, Jr.

CAW 2023 brings back to the Triangle, for only the second time, a shrimp bowl competition for regional breeders of shrimp. In 2020 8 people entered shrimp for a total of 12 lots. As seen in the photo, Lucas Bretz is seen in the photo judging that contest.

RAS welcomes Rob Lupton of Flip Aquatics as speaker and judge. I ordered my first shrimp from Rob back in 2015. He shipped Caridina serrata to Oregon with a red rams horn hitchhiker. I had not seen that type of snail before and asked him to send a few more. Hundreds of tangerine tiger shrimp and thousands of snails later I look forward to meeting Rob this Spring.

This year there will be spaces for people to enter two lots of shrimp each, at first. Also, a waitlist for a third entry for each person in case there is space once everyone who wants to participate has registered. The last day to register is March 15. Please consider registering early to help with planning.

Categories will likely be similar to the last one. Neocaridina sp. - red, Neocaridina sp. - all other colors, Caridina hybrids, and Caridina species. There will be three awards for each category, a best in show, and a people's choice for each category. Everyone attending CAW will have ballots to vote in their registration packet.

The set up will be similar to last time as well. Entrants will bring shrimp and a gallon of water from their home tank so all the animals will not have to adjust to new water parameters. The club will provide a small piece of cholla wood and some plant material in each bowl so the shrimp can have some hides.

I am looking forward to seeing all the different types of shrimp being bred locally. Thank you in advance to all who choose to participate by showing your shrimp, and to those who step forward to help put the event on.





(Article) I love Fish Keeping by Avery Stephens

My name is Avery Stephens, and I love Fish Keeping. My love for fish started when I moved to a Mebane and saw my grandma's tank for the first time. I was a child (Like, four or something) when I saw grandma's 55-gallon tank with an assortment of platies. Her tank was full of ornaments and artificial plants, and I was enamored with how lively and busy it looked. It was like a small city, or a piece of the ocean. It was from that moment I wanted to learn as much as I can about Fish Keeping.

After a few years into keeping fish and watching fish keeping videos, I wanted to put in my... input, and help others join the fish keeping hobby. So I decided to start a YouTube channel and started posting my own fish care videos. How to, species profiles, aquarium progress- you get the idea. But for some reason, my videos just weren't as popular as some of the bigger names (KGTropicals, FishyBizz, Dustin's Fish Tanks, etc.) And I saw they were doing the same thing. More accurately, I was doing what everyone else was doing...with noticeably lower quality. I watched other videos to see what other people were doing, see what got them so popular; what made them so interesting. I got to work posting pictures and videos of various fish behaviors, explaining what they're doing and why they're doing it. Not long after, I made an Instagram account. I am still relatively unknown. BUT THAT'S NOT

THE POINT! As we fish keepers know, a fish tank is much more than just a piece of furniture, it's an entire world. And should you pay close enough attention, you'll find every specimen therein- peaceful or aggressive, solitary or schooling- leads an interesting life. (Article) Aquatips: Keeping Black Worms by Brandon Berry

Since we're in the season for black worms again, here's a blast from the past from our own Brandon Berry. Reprinted from the RAS Newsletter, Dec. 2004, Submitted by Todd Wenzel, Librarian

I've found that I can keep about a pound of black worms in a fish net breeder, in my outdoor pond filter during the winter. I had some black worms that were not doing well in the fridge, so I figured I try something new. I put them in a net breeder, and hung them over the side of my 55 gallon drum pond filter. The next day, they were the healthiest looking black worms I had ever seen. I then bought about two more pounds and divided them between that net breeder and another one. I was amazed that despite the fact that they were piled over 2 inches thick, they were thriving. I've even begun to feed them some old fish food in hopes that they will multiply, or at least have a higher nutrient content. If you don't have an outdoor pond, I'd suggest just getting a 55-gallon drum, filling it to the top with water and putting some kind of bio-media in it such as lava rocks. Add a strong power head or large air stone and your set. Just hang the net around the side of the barrel. It will be interesting to see how warm the water can get in the spring and still have them doing well. I've had them breed in fish tanks with warm water, so I imagine that as long as they don't get too crowded and the oxygen content is sufficient in the water, they will do OK. I'll keep everyone posted.
